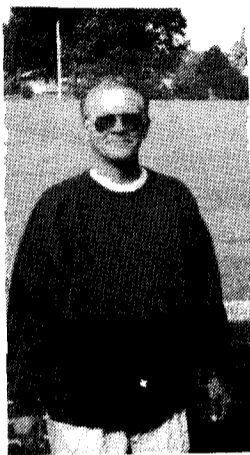

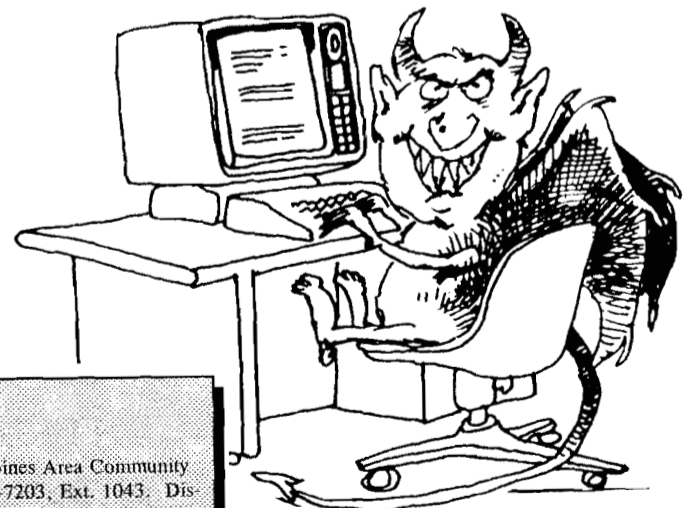

Today's job market is a fierce and competitive one. Any advantage that can be obtained might make the difference between getting the job you want to taking the job that will do, but was not your first or even second choice. From having the wrong information on your resume to not knowing enough about your job market, any little thing may cause your future employer to look the other way and hire the competition

In a four part series, the *Bear Facts* will examine today's job market, and the opportunities waiting for you.

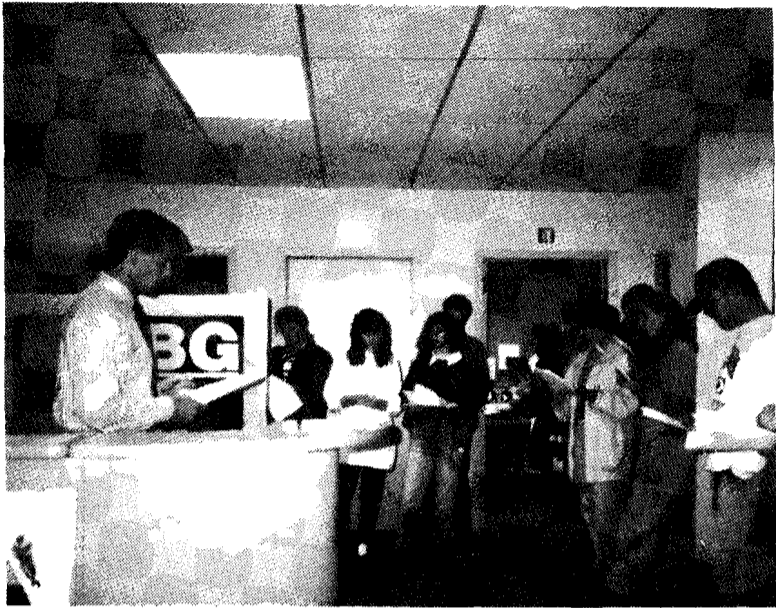

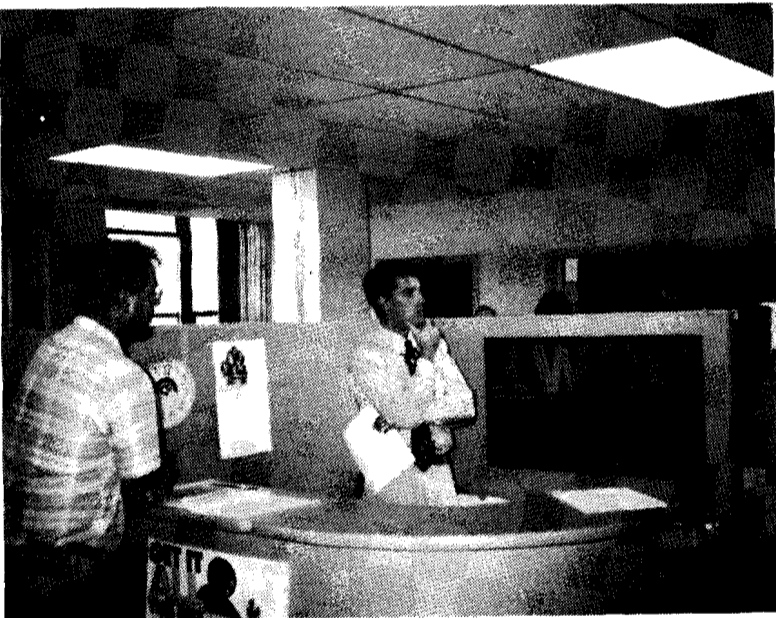

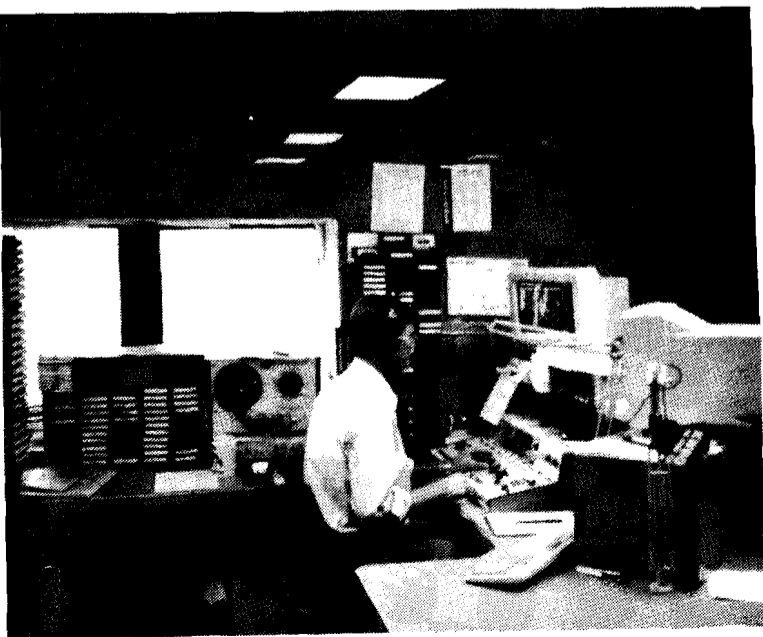

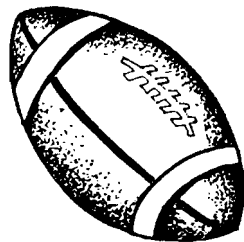
WILL SUN SHINE ON PHOENIX?

Advisor George Silberhorn passed out information on the responsibilities for leadership and the current budget. He also discussed the upcoming leadership conference in November.

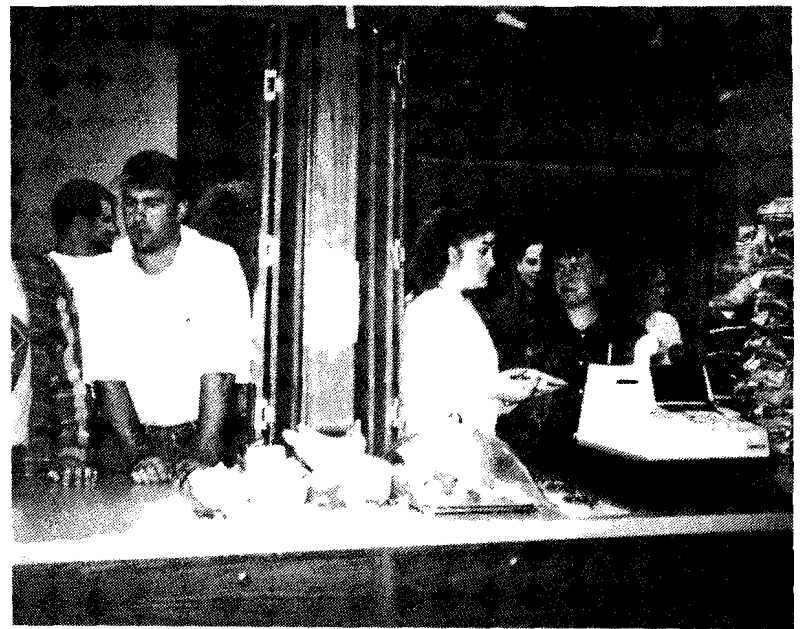
The board discussed activity fees, club balances, developing a format form for monetary allotment, and putting up suggestion boxes directed to the S.A.B. to facilitate student input to

The next scheduled meeting will be Monday, Oct. 24, 1994 at 3:30p.m. Linda Smith, S.A.B. Secretary

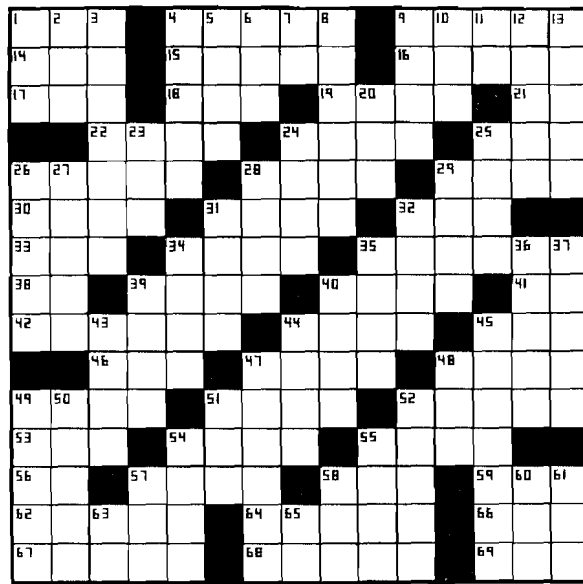
