The Emergency Services Program provides students the fundamental knowledge and skills needed to provide lifesaving services. Students must be at least 17 years of age by the first day of class. In addition to classroom time, students will be required to attend clinical and field rotations. *Upon completion students will earn a BLS Certificate and an EMT. Certificate. Students may also apply for State Licensure after completing the Academy.*
