This type of reporting captures and converts the spoken word to text. As the "guardians of the record," court reporters are responsible for producing verbatim transcripts of a variety of legal proceedings. From court cases and pretrial depositions to business and government meetings, speeches, and special events, they play a critical role whenever a verbatim record of the spoken word must be preserved.

FACTS ABOUT DMACC'S VIRTUAL COURT REPORTING PROGRAM

- » Live-virtual instruction is delivered through Microsoft Teams or Kaltura Classroom. These classes are synchronous with attendance required. Most classes meet between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m., Monday through Thursday. Some classes are Webblended or online, offering additional flexibility.
- » New students attend a visit day in May where they receive steno machine lease/purchase information and program details. The first two days of fall semester are on-campus in Newton, where students will build connections and learn foundational skills used throughout the program.
- » Professors are caring and highly qualified, nationally certified court reporters, with many combined years of education and court reporting experience.
- » Program is designed for completion in two years if all speed benchmarks are met, but individual progress will vary and repeating speed development classes to reach required graduation speeds may be required.
- » DMACC has the lowest tuition in lowa.**
- » Mentor and internship opportunities are offered with support from the Iowa Court Reporters Association.
- » Faculty strongly encourage prospective students to complete the free online NCRA A-Z program, which provides an introduction to steno and broadens scholarship opportunities.
