## IMPACTING STEM STUDENTS

For the past 36 years, Carolyn Boss has been on the leading edge of computer technology. In a variety of capacities in her career at IBM, she has had a front row seat to the advent of the "personal computer" era, seen artificial intelligence make leaps and bounds, and watched cloud computing remove the need for organizations to house large main-frame computers and servers on-site.

She has also seen the value of a career in the STEM-Science, Technology, Engineering and Math-fields. As a result, she and husband Bill have generously funded an endowed scholarship specifically for women pursuing a career in a STEM field.

Boss says her real-world experience at IBM, coupled with her work on Iowa Governor Terry Branstad's STEM Advisory Council, fueled her desire to pay forward the opportunity her schooling at DMACC, and eventually lowa State University, provided.

"My eyes were really opened during my time on the STEM Advisory Council," says Boss, who attended DMACC between 1975 and 1977, and graduated from Iowa State in 1979. "Young females rarely consider a career in the STEM professions. But there are so many opportunities. Our hope is that this scholarship will inspire more women to consider this career path."

Boss, who serves as a member of the DMACC Alumni Association Board, says it is important to introduce girls to what are often looked at as nontraditional careers as soon as possible. With a role model under the same roof, both of Boss's daughters, Emily and Courtney, have followed their mother into STEM fields.

"So much research out there shows that young girls don't favor STEM careers," Boss says. "The earlier we can inspire them, the greater the opportunity for them to find success."

Boss continues: "There are so many areas of life that are touched by STEM careers. And there are so many divisions of a given company that offer opportunities for those with STEM expertise."

And, as a loyal DMACC alum, she can't think of a better place to establish this type of endowed scholarship.

"The skills provided at DMACC in STEM areas offer a very good vehicle for students looking to move right into the workplace, or to pursue a four-year degree," she says. "It was really important to Bill and me to do something that mattered and we are confident that this scholarship will have a real impact."

## pportunity

As spouses do on a daily basis here in the United States, Batkhishig Batsukh eagerly relocated when her husband accepted a job offer. But instead of just facing the challenges of finding housing, transportation and a new job, Batkhishig was faced with starting from scratch in learning a new language and culture.

Like thousands of others each year, Batsukh turned to DMACC's English as a Second Language (ESL) program. She began taking the noncredit course in 2014 and recently moved into the more arduous credit course.

"I didn't speak any English," Batsukh says of her arrival on the first day of her first class. She moved to Des Moines from Mongolia. "In my country I had only learned [English] grammar and reading; no talking or listening.

"But I was not afraid," she continues. "I enjoy it."

#### A COMPREHENSIVE PROGRAM

Vera Aginsky, ESL professor at DMACC's Urban Campus in Des Moines, says Batsukh's experience is pretty typical. Very few of the noncredit ESL students have any experience communicating verbally in English, and some have no frame of reference on the language at all.

Many students enter the program without even the ability to understand or answer the question: "What is your name?" And it is not uncommon for students to have never even seen a computer.

While many born and raised in the United States might find life without a personal computer hard to imagine, the fact remains that the instructors in DMACC's ESL program have to be inventive to teach students who come to them with an externely limited—and in cases non-existent— English-speaking background.

In order to address students where they are, DMACC offers more introductory noncredit courses, as well as credit courses for students who are looking to further their schooling or are needing more advanced instruction for

their particular workplace situation.

The emphasis is on improving skills and building confidence. And the scope of the program—classes are offered across central lowa in eight different locations (see Page 8)—is designed to help as many students as possible access the classes.

"It is important that we have a presence across central Iowa," says Rick Carpenter, Executive Director, Program Development, DMACC Southridge Center. "We need to meet our ESL students where they are and make it convenient for them to access our services. It is a big step for many of our students and the more we can do to assist them the better they are set up for success."

#### **LANGUAGE AND CULTURE**

Many of the students are "third culture" individuals, who have lived, worked, studied, and grown up in another country different from their parents' or birth nationality. This can present challenges as students are faced with navigating a new set of cultural and linguistic norms especially during their formative years when identity is often guestioned or challeneged. "So much of who we are is connected to the language and culture we speak," says Katherine Menec, ESL Faculty Instructor.

The make-up of classes is continually evolving. As wars and conflicts erupt around the world, people seek a better life by immigrating to the United States.

Instructors are very welcoming of the settlement community and work to apply best learning practices to help students acquire language skills as quickly as possible.

The result is encouragement to continue to grow their English-speaking skills and motivation to continue to work to become a member of the community. In all the courses, there is an emphasis on respect. This is vitally important, because in so many cases, students have come from parts of the world where they were not treated very well.

#### **BUILDING A FOUNDATION**

Students typically show the most growth in the first three to five years, and it can generally take another five to nine years to add proficiency. The ESL faculty looks to build skills as quickly as possible.

"We don't want them to have to take classes for seven or eight or nine years," Menec says. "Language is always a work in progress. We want to provide them with the skills to effectively communicate and the motivation to continue working to develop their skills."

Batsukh says the format of classes encoruages interaction and that aspect is as valuable as the structured instruction.

"There are students from all over the world and from many different cultures," she says. "It is very interesting to learn about them and to learn from them. They are all very funny and friendly."

Bringing these students together is key. The more they interact with one another the more they are confident in engaging with those in the community.

And when they feel a like member of the community, they can quickly move themselves and their families from a situation where they are merely surviving to one in which they are thriving.

ESL instruction is offered at the noncredit and credit level across central lowa. The goal of the program is to provide quality ESL instruction to speakers of other languages so that they can succeed in academic or career programs.

**Credit ESL**: The ESL Credit Program is a bridge to assist English Language Learners in advancing their academic English skills for success in credit DMACC classes and/or advancement in their professional field.

**Noncredit ESL**: Noncredit ESL courses consist of multilevel English instruction for anyone 18 years or older. The courses move learners from a beginner level to a solid intermediate level of proficiency, and cover the four skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing, as well as improving pronunciation and building vocabulary. The primary goal is to teach communicative competence, that is, the ability to communicate in English according to the situation, purpose and roles of the participants.

# Campus Updates

#### **ANKENY**

Vice President Joe Biden held an invitation-only roundtable discussion centered on education accessibility and the importance of partnership between community colleges and businesses during his visit to DMACC Ankeny Campus on Thursday, Feb. 12.

#### **BOONE**

On February 24 the Iowa Court of Appeals set up a courtroom in the Boone Campus auditorium where they heard oral arguments for two cases. One case involved a vehicle stop on suspicion of OWI and the other involved issues related to second degree murder conviction.

Many community members and several DMACC classes were in attendance. The arguments were done in approximately one hour for both cases. The court issued written rulings that were shared with members of the audience at a later time.

Congratulations to the DMACC Bears men's basketball team for placing 4th in the NJCAA Division II national tournament. The Bears (28-7) reached the semifinals, and lost to Phoenix College in the third-place game. The Bears were ranked as high as number 1 in the nation during the season and ended the season as the 2nd-ranked team in the nation.

The Bears basketball team also had an exceptional season both on and off the court; in addition to the outstanding win-loss record, the student athletes also earned a 2.94 Team GPA for the first semester. All five sophomores are on pace to graduate in May.

The DMACC Women's Softball team played its first game on the new softball field March 21.

The new facility provides the nationally ranked program the opportunity to compete on the DMACC Boone Campus

home field. **DMACC** wrapped up the 2014 season with a third-place finish at the NJCAA



Division II National Tournament.

#### **CARROLL**

Carroll Campus Building Trade students are working to complete renovations for the near-campus student housing being offered for the fall 2015 semester. The building will be able to house 16 residents and will feature private rooms, great commons space and nine bathrooms. Additionally, great scholarship opportunities exist. New Hope Village is offering work opportunities for our students, especially for those entering our new human services program that will begin in the fall. Full classes are expected.

The purpose was to inform families about attending college and assist them in navigating the college admission process. The event was planned and implemented by a team of staff and faculty who attended the lowa Latina/o Education Initiative Conference last year. Approximately 30 students, primarily from our Interpretation & Translation and Early Childcare programs, served as interpreters, translators, child care assistants and volunteers. More than 115 quests attended. It was such a success that another Latino Family Night has been scheduled for the fall.

#### Ilima Young-Dunn is Social Worker of the Year 2015:



Ilima Young-Dunn was named Social Worker of the Year 2015 by the Iowa Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers (NASW). Ilima is Chair of DMACC's **Human Services** 

program. Ilima was publicly honored for her work during the April 2015 NASW-Iowa Annual Symposium.
