# The Joy of Giving

## PATTY HOLMES SCHOLARSHIP PAYS FORWARD APPRECIATION FOR DMACC EXPERIENCE

After realizing that she needed more than just a high school diploma to reach her career aspirations, Patty Holmes enrolled in DMACC. That one decision set Patty on the path to a career in Accounting that would include a Bachelor's degree from Simpson College, a Master's degree from Iowa State University, and the coveted CPA designation.

All of it eventually led right back to DMACC.

"As an undergrad, DMACC hired me to teach in the Accounting Lab and I discovered my passion for education," Patty says. "After receiving my degrees, DMACC hired me as a full-time instructor and I held this position for 40 years."

It would be impossible to count the number of students Patty has inspired over her four decades on the faculty at DMACC. And with a recent gift to the DMACC Foundation, she will continue to make an impact for years to come.

The Patty Holmes Accounting Scholarship was awarded for the first time last fall. Patty says she created the fund to address the regional need for highly skilled accountants.

"Des Moines has a large insurance and financial services industry, which drives the demand for accounting professionals," Patty says. "Not to mention that every business, large and small, performs accounting functions and needs to understand the often complex financial statements that are driving their business."

"Over the last few years," she continues, "employers in the area have commented that they need more students majoring in Accounting to meet their needs."

With that knowledge, Patty decided to act. The initial award went to Dung Huynh, a student who Patty says reminds her of herself. The two had the opportunity to meet for the first

time at the annual DMACC Foundation Scholarship Dinner in November.

"Meeting Dung was icing on the cake," Patty says. "Like myself when I was a student, she is going to school and managing home-life and works part-time."

Dung completed her studies at DMACC in May, and plans to attend Grand View University in Des Moines to pursue a Bachelor's degree in Accounting.

"Meeting Dung reinforced the reason I chose to create a scholarship at DMACC," Patty adds. "This is my opportunity to thank DMACC and the Accounting Program for the support and encouragement I received when I was a student."

Patty says early in her studies at DMACC, she was inspired by program faculty Ben Shales and Don Huntoon, going so far as to call them "my second family."

"They inspired me to always pay it forward," Patty says.

After retiring six years ago, Patty now serves on the Accounting Advisory Board, is the Treasurer for the DMACC Pioneers, and teaches part-time. She says it is humbling to be able to work with the Foundation to ensure that any student with the dream of pursuing an advanced education can do so.

"The Foundation is such a powerful tool that enables people like me to donate and give back through scholarships and other contributions," Patty says. "Thanks to the Foundation, we can help meet the needs of future students."

## Innovative Initiatives Invest in Students



Gifts from generous donors like Patty Holmes are only one way that the DMACC Foundation provides scholarship support to students. There are a number of innovative efforts driven by the Foundation and departments on each campus (see article at right!) that are reaching out to reward students in new and different ways.

Among these is providing scholarships to those who are considering attending DMACC. Annually, a series of Discover DMACC events are hosted on each of our campuses. Those events are designed to provide an orientation to the campus, a discussion of academic and vocational programs available, and time for interaction with faculty and staff.

Those attending a Discover DMACC session also have the opportunity to walk away with a scholarship. In the most recent year, 413 prospective students attended one of these sessions.

# Showcasing Their Skills

## ANNUAL EVENT BRINGS IN HIGH SCHOOL COMPETITORS FROM ACROSS THE STATE

Each year, the Automotive Technology program on DMACC's Ankeny Campus hosts a competition for high school students with an interest in the automobile industry. The contest, which awards thousands of dollars worth of prizes—mostly in the form of tools of the trade—along with DMACC Foundation scholarships is cosponsored by the Iowa Automobile Dealers Association (IADA).

In the middle of October, a written exam is sent out to interested students across Iowa.

"We invite students from schools all across the state," says Jerry Burns, a professor of Automotive Technology and one of the coordinators of the event. "The top eight schools from the

written portion are invited to come here in December for the hands-on portion."

The contest, which has been offered for almost three decades, typically receives responses to the written portion from 15-20 schools representing more than 300 students. The winners of the hands-on portion are then sponsored by the IADA to participate in the national competition.

"This is a great way to introduce students interested in Automotive Technology to our program," Burns says. "It also provides them with insight on the skills required of professional technicians working in the automotive service and repair industry."

## DES MOINES RAPPER AND ADVOCATE SHARES MESSAGE OF HOPE AND INSPIRATION AT ANNUAL CIWEEK EVENT ON WEST CAMPUS

Des Moines rapper Will Keeps is open about his struggles as a youngster. It is that willingness to put it all on the table that he hopes will help others avoid the mistakes he made.

Will shared his message of hope and motivation as part of the annual ciWeek celebration on DMACC West Campus in West Des Moines. His message was simple: We can all do better.

"I learned a lot from the streets—mostly what not to be and what kinds of things will get you in trouble," Will says. He was born and raised in Chicago before moving to Des Moines to live with family two decades ago. "It became clear the types of people I was choosing to hang around with were bringing me down."

The realization motivated Will to do all he could to help others avoid his missteps. In Des Moines he has become a legend. He regularly includes local students in his rap videos, shares an open dialogue with local law enforcement, has worked tirelessly to develop relationships with local judges, attorneys and teachers, and has founded a number

of initiatives aimed at helping at-risk youth harness every opportunity available to them.

Among his most novel offerings is "The Porch," a regular gathering of students designed to foster meaningful, positive friendships.

"Back in the day we used to sit on the porch and just talk about anything," Will says of his childhood, and inspiration for the program. "That's just what we do. It is an open forum. And it has been very successful. The kids enjoy the positive reinforcement of having a place to hang out, talk and have fun."

In speaking at ciWeek, he simply wanted to leave the audience feeling empowered to make their mark in life.

"My message is simple. It's not about what you've been through, it's how you got through," Will says. "I want people to see that I have been through a lot, but I didn't allow that to stop me. I want people who find themselves in a difficult situation to find hope in my story."
